Profiles of Elder Nominees

INTRODUCTION

We are pleased to be able to present to the Congregation information about the people who have responded to the call to accept nomination for election to serve as Elders on Church Council. We thank God for their gifts and talents and their offering to serve in this very important role.

When considering nominees, we ask that you take the following points into consideration:

- 1. Our Church Council is a visionary council and is called by God to guide us as a faith community. We look to them to use their spiritual gifts as they lead us in ministry and mission.
- 2. Each year we look to refresh the council with new members. These nominees are standing for a five-year term.
- 3. The nominees will add a diversity of gifts and talents to the existing council.

The Church Council is made up of eleven lay members as well as Rob, Benji, and Ashlee. With six current Church Councillors continuing in their term, there are five lay vacancies and three nominees. The Uniting Church regulations, state that to be elected, a person must have the general support of the Congregation indicated by receiving votes from at least 50 per cent of those voting. The election of Elders will take place at the AGM at 11:30am on Sunday, 22 November at BCUC.

Benji has met with all of our nominees and is confident that they understand the role and responsibilities involved in serving as an Elder on Church Council. We encourage you to rely on the gift of the Holy Spirit for discernment in this voting process - please stop, pray, and listen before making your decision.

I'm looking forward to doing more for God at BCUC. Thank you.

Profile and Role of an Elder serving on BCUC Church Council

The Uniting Church Regulation 3.1.13(a) lists the duties and responsibilities of the church Council:

"The Church Council shall give priority in its life to building up the congregation in faith and love, sustaining members in hope, and leading the congregation to fuller participation in Christ's mission in the world. This priority shall be reflected in the agenda of its ordinary meetings."

Uniting Church Code of Conduct for Elders/Church Councillors

The Uniting Church in Australia believes that all people are made in the image of God and as such we should accept every individual regardless of race, creed or genders.

As a Christian community we believe that God reaches out to us in love and acceptance and that our relationship with each other should express love and respect and not be abused.

As a community of faith, we are committed to providing a place in society where human beings can explore what it means to be made in the image of God.

BCUC Church Council recognises it's responsibility to provide worshipping and pastoral activities that are free from abuse and that provides a safe environment for all people to explore and express their faith in the Gospel.

BCUC Elders/Church Councillors recognise Christian governance and leadership is:

- Dependent on prayer
- Requires being a good team player
- Involves people with different gifts, strengths and personalities

Profile of a BCUC Elder/Councillor

At BCUC our Elders / Church Councillors will lead by example. Key attributes include:

- Being a member of BCUC
- Actively participating in the life and ministry of the Church, regularly attending worship, small groups etc.
- Seeking to grow their spiritual gifts and personal strengths as Christian disciples by studying scriptures and praying regularly
- Sharing their faith
- Being a servant of the church giving time, talents and finances to the work of the Church as an expression of their gratitude to God
- Exercising authority with love
- Keeping confidential, sensitive issues shared at Church Council
- Committing to attending monthly Council meetings regularly with appropriate preparation
